<b>Unit of Work</b>	RE – What do different people believe about God? (L2.1)
<b>Text Driver the Unit of Work Links to</b>	N/a
<b>Key Strand</b>	Believing: Religious beliefs, teachings, sources; questions about meaning, purpose and truth
<b>Overview of the Unit of Work</b>	Pupils will learn, from different religions and spiritual ways of life, the diverse beliefs about God. They will explore ways in which we all exercise trust and faith in our everyday lives, linking to examples of how we know something without seeing it or experiencing it ourselves. Pupils will explore the key question, ‘What do people believe about God?’ from a range of religious perspectives (Christian, Muslim and Hindu). Additionally, pupils will explore why some people do not believe in God and the similarities and differences of how this difference in perspectives can influence a person’s approach to life.
<b>Prior Learning &amp; Vocabulary</b>	During the Autumn Term in Year 3, the children will have learnt the key objects and rituals that form part of a Christian’s daily life. Pupils will have explored the positives and challenges of being a Christian in Britain today. They will have developed their own ideas about Christianity and explored these from their own perspectives.  <b>Vocabulary:</b> Christian, Christianity, God, Jesus, Bible, faith, religion, worship, prayer
<b>Sticky Knowledge</b>	Pupils will learn: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The different ways that Christianity expresses ideas about God (e.g. view of God as Trinity, art expressing ideas about God, Christian reflections of biblical stories)</li> <li>• Some of the ways in which Islam expresses ideas about Allah/God (e.g. the 99 Names of Allah, calligraphy)</li> <li>• Some of the ways in which Hindus express ideas about the ultimate reality and the gods and goddesses (e.g. the Trimurti)</li> <li>• The influence God has on the lives of believers</li> <li>• About why some people do not believe in God (focus on Humanists)</li> </ul>
<b>New Vocabulary</b>	Trinity: the unity of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit Muslim: a follower of the Islamic faith Hindu: a follower of the Hindu faith Allah: the only god of the Islamic faith

	<p>Prophet Muhammed (pbuh): the last messenger of Allah</p> <p>Trimurti: triad of the three Hindu gods Brahma, Vishnu and Shiva</p> <p>Humanist: rejects the idea or belief in a supernatural being such as God.</p> <p>Agnostic: neither believes or disbelieves in a god as there is no way to prove their existence</p> <p>Atheist: does not believe in God or gods</p>
<b>Post Learning</b>	<p>Y3 Summer term: Pupils will develop their understanding of Christians, Muslims and Hindus, with a specific focus on prayer.</p> <p>Pupils will also reflect on non-religious beliefs about prayer (atheists).</p>
